





# Bumper harvest helps keep economy afloat


The South African economy grew by 2,0% in the third quarter of 2017, down from a revised 2,8% in the second quarter. This is according to the latest gross domestic product (GDP) figures.

After recording an increase of 38,7% in the second quarter, the agriculture industry continued to power ahead, expanding by 44,2% in the third quarter.

This is the largest quarterly jump in agriculture production since the second quarter of 1996. Increased production of field crops and horticultural products were the main contributors to growth.

This season's maize crop is expected to be the largest on record. The Crop Estimates Committee have pegged commercial maize production for this season at 16,74 million tonnes, higher than the current record of 14,66 million tonnes harvested in 1980/81.

## How much do you pay?


The money you pay for your motor vehicle licence goes to provincial government's tax coffers.

Provinces collected a total of R10,93 billion in taxes in the 2015/16 fiscal year, according to Stats SA's latest *Financial statistics of provincial government*. This includes money from motor vehicle licences and other sources, such as gambling licences.

Gauteng and KwaZulu-Natal collected just over half of total taxes, followed by Western Cape.

Other spheres of government also collect tax from various sources. <u>This article</u> provides detail how much tax contributes to total government revenue.
