











Limitations of the report

- Reports only capex spend (by type) during their financial year
- Does not verify the existence of the fixed assets purchased or constructed
- Does not indicate timeframes for structures completed or to be completed
- Reports on funds that were actually spent, not future or expected capex
- Does not reconcile different year-ends of the reporting units
- Does not compare capex spent across different reporting units














757 institutions belong to the public-sector family (year: 2018)

















Public-sector capex has been on the decline since 2016










Provincial government was the only institution type that increased capex

Percentage change in total capital expenditure, 2018 compared with 2017








Public corporations are responsible for over 40% of public-sector capex

Contribution to total capital expenditure by institution (2018 total: R250 billion)








Eskom was responsible for a quarter of total public-sector capex


Top 20 biggest public-sector spenders on capex in 2018

Public corporations with the highest capex spend, 2018



The main contributor to overall public-sector capex. R63,3 billion was spent on government funded electricity generation projects, plant and vehicle builds



Downscaled capex projects in 2018. Most of the capex (R24,9 billion) was spent on purchases of various equipment and on new wagons for freight rail.



Decreased capex from R8,2 billion in 2017 to R7,4 billion in 2018. Spending was mainly focused on the Next Generation Network Programme and expansion of the mobile network.



Capex declined to R6,2 billion in 2018 from R6,7 billion in 2017. Spending was focused on the acquisition of new trains, replacement of old network lines and on the National Station Improvement Programme.


Total capital expenditure by municipalities

Johannesburg

Down from R7,7 billion in 2017 to R6,6 billion in 2018

Expenditure incurred mainly on design and construction of a Park 'n Ride in Greenside Region E and on the purchases of air lifting equipment for Martindale B and on the construction of a new community Centre in Matholesville C region.



<u>Ekurhuleni</u>

Up from R5,1 billion in 2017 to to R5,9 billion in 2018

Expenditure incurred mainly on the construction of Tembisa West Fire Station, KwaThema Precinct, new EMPD Training Academy, upgrades and refurbishment of Kempton Park and Germiston Civic Centre buildings.



Cape Town

Down from R6,3 billion in 2017 to **R5,7 billion** in 2018

Expenditure incurred mainly on infrastructure assets under construction and service concessions assets on airports, energy distribution networks, electricity mains in prisons, hospitals, and upgrades of roads, drains, bridges and tunnels.








Total capital expenditure by provincial government departments



South African National Roads Agency	R10,1 billion	Strengthening, improvements and construction of new roads including work on the R573 Moloto Road.
Property Management Trading Entity	R3,5 billion	New purchase and tenant installation, state owned refurbishments and new constructions of schools.
Road Agency Limpopo	R1,6 billion	Construction of new roads and bridges around Limpopo.
Water Trading Entity	R1,6 billion	Construction of 11 project phases, a training centre and 47 projects were completed under the Water Services Infrastructure Grant (WSIG).
Agricultural Land Holding Account	R0,6 billion	Construction of Agri-Parks programme, 149 primary production and 45 socio-economic infrastructure projects for revitalisation of rural town's villages.
South African Revenue Service	R0,5 billion	Development of IT software and acquisition of computer and other equipment including leases.













National government has cut back on capex since 2016









National government departments with the highest capex spend, 2018

Water Affairs	R3,4 billion	Augmentation projects namely: Foxwood Dam, uMkhomazi water project, Phase 2A of Mokolo-Crocodile (West) and Berg River.
South African Police Service	R2,9 billion	Construction of eight police stations at Pholile and Qhasa in Eastern Cape and one at Mareetsane in North West
Basic Education	R1,6 billion	Construction of 15 school projects all of which these projects are currently under construction.
Defence	R1,6 billion	Most expenditure was on non-residential buildings and transport equipment.
Justice and Constitutional Development	R1,2 billion	Construction of justice courts and renovation of offices and underground parking's in various regional offices.
Rural Development and Land Reform	R0,7 billion	Expenditure on some industrial buildings and some portable non-residential buildings.


Total capital expenditure by higher education institutions
