Financial statistics of national government

2011/2012

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Key findings

The net change in the stock of cash from the national revenue fund and donor funds amounted to a cash deficit of R26 946 million for the 2011/2012 fiscal year.

Cash receipts from operating activities amounted to R764 504 million and cash payments for operating activities amounted to R900 423 million, resulting in a net cash outflow from operating activities of R135 919 million for the 2011/2012 fiscal year ending 31 March 2012. Purchases of non-financial assets amounted to R11 984 million for 2011/2012. Sales of non-financial assets amounted to R115 million for the 2011/2012 fiscal year, resulting in a net cash outflow from investments in non-financial assets of R11 869 million. The net acquisition of financial assets other than cash amounted to R4 345 million for the 2011/2012 fiscal year. The net incurrence of liabilities amounted to R125 187 million, resulting in net cash inflow of R120 842 million for the 2011/2012 fiscal year. The total net change in the stock of cash for national government amounted to a cash deficit of R26 946 million (see Table A, p. 5).

Economic classification of the cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets from the national revenue fund and donor funds received.

The national revenue fund refers to the votes of the national departments as well as to fixed statutory appropriations and standing appropriations. Economic classification of expenditure is in general a measure of the nature and economic effect of government operations on the economy of a country. Seven main economically classified cash payments for operating activity categories exist: compensation of employees; purchases of goods and services; interest; subsidies; grants; social benefits; and other payments.

The accounts of the national government are kept on a cash basis, i.e. all transactions are recorded at the time when warrant vouchers are issued for payment regardless of when the obligations for payments originated.

The contribution of cash receipts from operating activities, and the contribution of cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets to total expenditure by economic classification.

Cash receipts from operating activities increased by R73 360 million from R691 144 million in 2010/2011 to R764 504 million in 2011/2012 mainly due to an increase in taxes collected.

Cash payments for operating activities increased by R108 720 million from R791 703 million in 2010/2011 to R900 423 million in 2011/2012 mainly due to an increase in grant payments.

The largest contributor to total cash payments for operating activities for the 2011/2012 fiscal year was grants (R531 683 million), followed by social benefits (R101 401 million), compensation of employees (R95 717 million), interest (R76 464 million), purchases of goods and services (R51 235 million), other payments (R32 504 million) and subsidies (R11 420 million) (see Table A, p. 5, Figure 1, p. 6).

The increase of R63 093 million in grants from R468 590 million in 2010/2011 to R531 683 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in transfers from national government to provincial governments and municipalities.

The increase of R9 927 million in interest from R66 537 million in 2010/2011 to R76 464 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in interest paid on public debt.

The increase of R9 924 million in social benefits from R91 477 million in 2010/2011 to R101 401 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in payments of social grants to households by the Department of Social Development.

The increase of R8 981 million in other payments from R23 523 million in 2010/2011 to R32 504 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in capital transfer payments to public corporations.

The increase of R8 650 million in compensation of employees from R87 067 million in 2010/2011 to R95 717 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in compensation of employees by the South African Police Service and the Department of Correctional Services.

The increase of R7 610 million in purchases of goods and services from R43 625 million in 2010/2011 to R51 235 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to the creation of a new vote in the 2011/2012 fiscal year and an increase in purchases of goods and services by Statistics South Africa (R1 644 million increase due to the population census), the Department of Public Works (R1 269 million increase) and the Department of Correctional Services (R985 million increase).

The increase of R537 million in subsidies from R10 883 million in 2010/2011 to R11 420 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in subsidies paid by the Department of Trade and Industry and the Department of Transport to private enterprises and public corporations.

The decrease of R420 million in purchases of non-financial assets from R12 404 million in 2010/2011 to R11 984 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to decreases in capital expenditure on non-residential buildings by the Department of Public Works, the South African Police Service and the Department of Correctional Services.

Figure 1 – Economic classification of the cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets for the 2010/2011 and 2011/2012 fiscal years

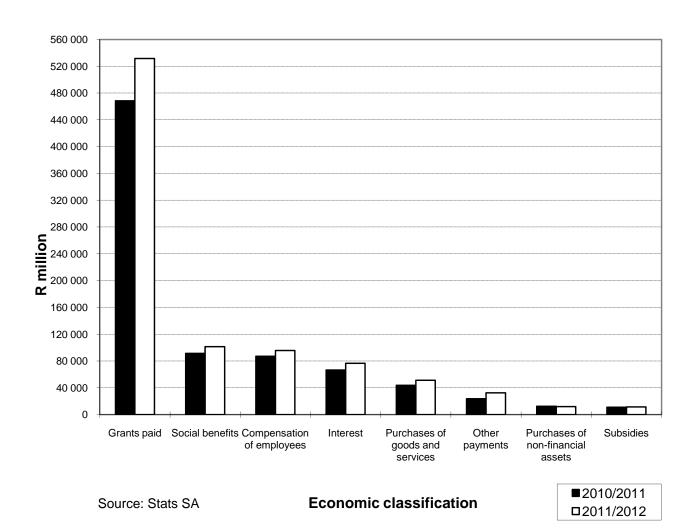
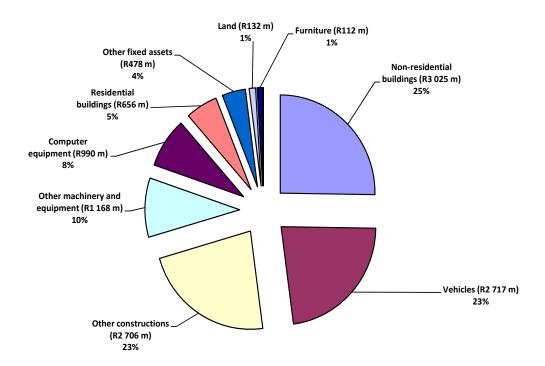


Figure 2 – Economic classification of cash payments for purchases of non-financial assets for the 2011/2012 fiscal year

Functional classification of the cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets from the national revenue fund and donor funds received.

Functional classification of expenditure measures the purpose for which transactions are undertaken. It is generally used to measure the allocation of resources by government in order to promote government objectives and various services rendered to the community. The functionally classified expenditure categories are indicated in Table B, page 10. There are ten main categories of functional classification of cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets: general public services; defence; public order and safety; economic affairs; environmental protection; housing and community amenities; health; recreation, culture and religion; education; and social protection.

The contribution of cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets to total expenditure by functional classification.

Total cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets from the national revenue fund and donor funds increased by R108 301 million from R804 107 million in 2010/2011 to R912 408 million in the 2011/2012 fiscal year.

The largest contributors to the total cash payments for operating activities and purchases of non-financial assets of R912 408 million from the national revenue fund and donor funds for the 2011/2012 fiscal year were transfers of a general character between different levels of government institutions and funds (R333 906 million or 36,6%) (mainly to provincial governments to defray their expenditure on general government services); followed by total social protection (R106 574 million or 11,7%); total public order and safety (R88 820 million or 9,7%); total economic affairs (R83 312 million or 9,1%); public debt transactions (mainly interest) (R76 370 million or 8,4%); total housing and community amenities (R44 918 million or 4,9%); executive and legislative services, financial and fiscal affairs, foreign affairs other than foreign aid (R43 247 million or 4,7%); total education (R42 053 million or 4,6%); total defence (R34 659 million or 3,8%); total health (R29 344 million or 0,5%); total recreation, culture and religion (R4 052 million or 0,4%); and total environmental protection (R3 242 million or 0,4%) (see Table B, p. 10, Figure 3, p. 11).

The increase of R30 319 million in cash payments for transfers of a general character between different levels of government from R303 587 million in 2010/2011 to R333 906 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in grants paid to provincial governments.

The increase of R15 817 million in cash payments for transport from R26 870 million in 2010/2011 to R42 687 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to increased provincial road maintenance grants paid by the Department of Transport to provincial governments and capital transfers to the South African National Roads Agency Ltd.

The increase of R12 219 million in cash payments for education from R29 834 million in 2010/2011 to R42 053 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to increased grants paid to provincial governments for funding technical secondary school recapitalisation, purchases of goods and services by the Department of Basic Education, grants to extra-budgetary accounts and funds, and grants to universities and universities of technology by the Department of Higher Education and Training.

The increase of R10 200 million in cash payments for public debt transactions from R66 170 million in 2010/2011 to R76 370 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to increased payments of interest on public debt.

The increase of R9 853 million in cash payments for social protection from R96 721 million in 2010/2011 to R106 574 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in social grants to households by the Department of Social Development.

The increase of R7 185 million in cash payments for housing and community amenities from R37 733 million in 2010/2011 to R44 918 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in grants paid by the Department of Human Settlements to municipalities to fund infrastructure development related to human settlements.

The increase of R4 856 million in cash payments for health from R24 488 million in 2010/2011 to R29 344 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to an increase in grants by the national Department of Health to provincial Departments of Health for the funding of health services.

The increase of R4 058 million in cash payments for defence from R30 601 million in 2010/2011 to R34 659 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to increased grants to extra-budgetary accounts and funds, spending on goods and services and on compensation of employees.

The increase of R3 481 million in cash payments for police from R55 505 million in 2010/2011 to R58 986 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to increased spending on compensation of employees and purchases of goods and services by the South African Police Service.

The increase of R2 981 million in cash payments for general services from R12 746 million in 2010/2011 to R15 727 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to increased spending on purchases of goods and services by Statistics South Africa, the Department of Public Works and on compensation of employees by the Department of Home Affairs.

The increase of R2 014 million in cash payments for general economic, commercial and labour affairs from R10 368 million in 2010/2011 to R12 382 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to increases in subsidies and transfers to public corporations, and grants to extra-budgetary accounts and funds by the Department of Trade and Industry and National Treasury.

The decrease of R1 589 million in cash payments for executive and legislative services, financial and fiscal affairs, foreign affairs other than foreign aid from R44 836 million in 2010/2011 to R43 247 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to decreased grants paid to provincial governments by National Treasury.

The decrease of R598 million in cash payments for general public services n.e.c. from R1 438 million in 2010/2011 to R840 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to a decrease in grants to the Electoral Commission by the Department of Home Affairs.

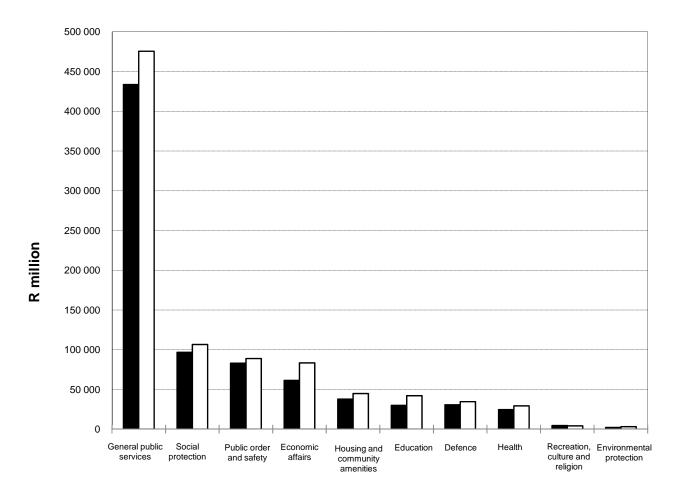
The decrease of R386 million in cash payments for recreation, culture and religion from R4 438 million in 2010/2011 to R4 052 million in 2011/2012 was mainly due to a decrease in grants paid to municipalities by the Department of Sports and Recreation which resulted from the completion of stadiums for the preparation of the 2010 FIFA World Cup, and a decrease in subsidies paid by the Department of Communications to the South African Broadcasting Corporation (SABC) and the South African Post Office (SAPO).

Explanatory notes

Introduction

This statistical release includes economic and functional classifications of the cash payments from the national revenue fund and donor funds for the 2011/2012 fiscal year.

The national revenue fund refers to the votes of the national departments as well as fixed statutory appropriations and standing appropriations.

Donor funds consist mainly of donations from other countries and foreign institutions.

Disaggregated data (Tables 1 to 8) of Table D will be available on the Stats SA website.

Methodology

National departments keep their accounts on a cash basis, i.e. all transactions are recorded at the time when warrant vouchers are issued for payment regardless of when obligations for payments originated. The statistics thus measure transactions as they are completed between the national departments and the rest of the economy.

The information is processed from the bookkeeping systems of national departments. The total expenditure of each department corresponds with the totals published by the Auditor-General.

The transactions between the national departments have not been eliminated but are shown as transfers to national departments. These kinds of transactions consist mainly of state attorney services rendered by the Department of Justice and Constitutional Development.

Donor funding not used and surrendered back to the donor was shown as surrender of donor funds to foreign countries (transfer to foreign countries).

Classification

Annual changes for the functional classifications are also provided. The 2010/2011 classified information is generally comparable with the 2011/2012 information.

The Public Sector Classification Committee (PSCC)

The Public Sector Classification Committee (PSCC) consists of SARB, Stats SA, and NT. The purpose of the PSCC is to coordinate the economic institutional classification of the public sector units and subsectors for purposes of reporting to national and international stakeholders. The classification lists are made public by the SARB to inform stakeholders of the scope of the public sector and sub-sectors. The three primary stakeholders signed a Memorandum of Understanding. Classification of public sector institutions has taken place for the fiscal year ended 31 March 2010. Currently the PSCC is finalizing the classification of the public sector institutions for the year ending 31 March 2011.

Revisions

Revisions are due to certain transactions which were reclassified owing to better information becoming available from annual reports.

Glossary

Accrual basis of recording

Accrual basis of recording means that flows are recorded at the time economic value is created, transformed, exchanged, transferred, or extinguished.

Buildings and Structures

Consist of dwellings, non-residential buildings and other structures.

Capital transfers

Capital transfers involve the acquisition of assets by the recipient and may consist of a transfer of cash that the recipient is expected or required to use to acquire an asset or assets (other than inventories), the transfer of an asset (other than inventories and cash), the cancellation of a liability by mutual agreement between the creditor and debtor, or the assumption of another unit's debt. If doubt exists regarding the character of a grant, it should be classified as current.

Cash basis of recording

Cash basis of recording means that transactions are captured when cash is received or when cash payment is made.

Collective services

Collective services refer to the services provided collectively to the community and are particularly applicable on services such as general administration, public order and safety and economic services.

Compensation of employees

Compensation of employees is the total remuneration, in cash or in kind, payable to a government employee in return for work done during the accounting period, except for work connected with own account capital formation. It includes both wages and salaries and social contributions.

Cultivated assets

Consist of animals and plants that are used repeatedly or continuously for more than one year to produce other goods or services.

Dwellings

Buildings that are used entirely or primarily as residences, including garages and other associated structures. Houseboats, barges, mobile homes, flats, hostels, nursing homes and caravans that are used as principal residences are also included. Dwellings acquired for military personnel are included because they are used in the same way as dwellings acquired by civilians.

Economic classification

A measure of the nature and economic effect of government operations on the economy of the country.

Extra-budgetary accounts and funds

Accounts and funds of national and provincial governments not included in normal budget totals and which do not operate through normal budgetary procedures e.g. trading accounts and general government accounts.

Financial assets

Financial assets consist of financial claims, monetary gold and Special Drawing Rights (SDRs) allocated by the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

Financial public corporations

Units primarily engaged in both incurring liabilities and acquiring financial assets in the market. Note: Financial institutions may be entirely or mainly owned and/or controlled by the government in which case they are regarded as public financial institutions. It is the prime function of public financial institutions to act as intermediaries.

Fixed assets

Fixed assets are produced assets that are used repeatedly or continuously in production processes for more than one year.

Functional classification

Functional classification of expenditure measures the purpose for which transactions are undertaken. It is generally used to measure the allocation of resources by government in order to promote various services and objectives rendered to the community.

GFS Manual (2001)

The manual describes a specialised macroeconomic statistical system (Government Finance Statistics system) designed to support fiscal analysis.

Government consumption expenditure

Expenditure on all goods and services, which are used (without further transformation in the production) by the government units for the direct satisfaction of individual needs or wants or the collective needs of members of the community.

Grants

Grants are non-compulsory current or capital transfers received by a government unit from either another government unit or an international organisation.

Households

Household may be defined as individuals or a small group of persons who share the same living accommodation.

Individual services

Individual services refer to services rendered to individuals or a small group of persons. This category applies particularly to community and social services for example education, health and welfare.

Intangible fixed assets

Consist of mineral exploration; computer software; entertainment, literary and artistic originals; and miscellaneous other intangible fixed assets. To qualify as a fixed asset, the item must be intended for use in production for more than one year and its use must be restricted to the units that have established ownership rights over it or to units licensed by the owner.

Inventories

Inventories are goods and services held by producers for sale, use in production, or other use at a later date.

Liabilities

A present obligation of the entity arising from past events, the settlement of which is expected to result in an outflow from the entity of resources embodying economic benefits.

Machinery and equipment

Machinery and equipment include motor vehicles, ships, aircraft, equipment and furniture. Military expenditure on machinery and equipment which could be used for civilian purposes is included.

Non-financial public corporations

Non-financial public corporations are government owned and/or controlled units, which sell industrial or commercial goods and services to the public on a large scale.

Non-produced assets

Non-produced assets consist of tangible assets, natural occurring assets over which ownership is enforced. Natural occurring assets include land, subsoil assets and other naturally occurring assets.

Non-profit institutions serving households (NPISH)

Non-profit institutions which are mainly engaged in non-market production and serve households.

Non-residential buildings

All buildings other than dwellings. Examples of types of buildings included in this category are office buildings, schools, prisons, hospitals, buildings for public entertainment, warehouse and industrial buildings, commercial buildings, hotels and restaurants.

Other fixed assets

Consist of cultivated assets and intangible fixed assets.

Other structures

All structures other than buildings. Included are the following: highways, streets, roads, bridges, elevated highways, tunnels, railways, subways, airfield runways, sewers, waterways, harbors, dams, other waterworks, shafts, tunnels, other structures associated with mining subsoil assets, communication lines, power lines, pipelines, outdoor sport and recreation facilities.

SNA (1993)

The System of National Accounts (SNA) is the internationally agreed standard set of recommendations on how to compile measures of economic activity in accordance with strict accounting conventions based on economic principles.

Social benefits

Social benefits are transfers in cash or in kind to protect the entire population or specific segment of it against certain social risks.

Social contributions

Social contributions are actual receipt from either employer on behalf of their employee or from employee, self-employed, or non-employed persons on their own behalf that secure entitlement to social benefits for their contributors, their dependents or their survivors.

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General information

Stats SA publishes approximately 300 different releases each year. It is not economically viable to produce them in more than one of South Africa's eleven official languages. Since the releases are used extensively, not only locally but also by international economic and social-scientific communities, Stats SA releases are published in English only.
