

Consumer inflation jumps to a 5-year high

statistics for business

Annual consumer price inflation quickened to 6,5% in May from 5,9% in April and March, breaking through the upper limit of the South African Reserve Bank's monetary policy target range. This is the highest reading since January 2017 when the rate was 6,6%.

Transport and food and non-alcoholic beverages (NAB) accounted for just over half of the annual rate, with sharp price increases recorded in both categories. Fuel in particular continues to be a major contributor: if the impact of fuel is removed from the CPI reading in May, the headline rate falls to 5,1% from 6,5%.

Prices for food and NAB jumped by 2,1% between April and May, representing the largest monthly increase since February 2016 when the monthly rise was also 2,1%. At that time the country was experiencing a severe drought.



Where do households get their income from?

Households obtain their income from various sources. Data from the General Household Survey (GHS) shows the extent to which households rely on salaries, social grants, remittances and pensions.

In 2021, 52.4% of households in South Africa relied on salaries as their main source of income, followed by grants, other sources, and remittances.

Western Cape and Gauteng were the only two provinces in which more than 60% of households reported salaries as the dominant source. Households in Eastern Cape relied largely on social grants.


