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

Liquid ledger: SA develops experimental water resource accounts

A water resource account is a balance sheet for a geographical area, providing data on water inflows, water outflows and changes in water storage. Detailed accounts, published for the period 2015 to 2021, provide modelled estimates of water flows for three catchment areas.

Indicators were developed from these accounts. The evaporation ratio, for example, represents the portion of rainfall that is lost to evaporation. A higher ratio indicates a situation where evaporation has removed a greater share of water from precipitation.

The ratio is available for 56 quaternary catchments that make up the Breede Catchment in Western Cape. The areas with lower-than-average evaporation ratios are in the northern parts of the catchment, and those with higher evaporation ratios are located centrally. The quaternary catchments H10L and H20H (in the Worcester area) recorded the highest ratios.



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

In 2022, domestic tourism expenditure exceeded its pre-pandemic high

Tourism: the state of recovery

Domestic tourism expenditure has recovered – and exceeded – its pre-pandemic level. Tourism expenditure represents money that domestic (resident) visitors and inbound (non-resident) visitors spend during their travels.

The graphic shows total expenditure for 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022, broken down by the type of tourism (inbound, outbound and domestic). Domestic visitors spent R435,8 billion in 2022. This represents a sharp rise from R286,3 billion in 2021 and is higher than the 2019 prepandemic value of R334,2 billion.

The same cannot be said for the other two forms of tourism. Inbound tourism expenditure (money that non-resident visitors spend while in South Africa) and outbound tourism expenditure (money that South African residents take out of the country to spend abroad) are still below prepandemic levels.

Solar energy for the poor

Households and businesses are adopting alternative sources of energy as load shedding bites. What may not be well known is that many municipalities are in the game too, providing off-grid energy sources to the poorest households.

The Free Basic Alternative Energy (FBAE) policy instructs municipalities to supply alternative sources of energy to poor households that are not connected to the grid. In 2022, 21 municipalities across seven provinces supplied solar home systems to 149 919 households. The Ekurhuleni Metropolitan Municipality provided solar home systems to the largest number of households.

Of particular interest is the concentration of municipalities in the northern parts of Eastern Cape, where two administrative levels provide the service across the same area. Alfred Nzo District Municipality and its four local municipalities are all actively involved in rolling out solar home systems.

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
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
